

Was Jesus crucified on a cross or stake or tree?

\*\*\*Joe\*\*\* Hey Bob, considering the most ancient manuscripts available, was Jesus hung on a stake, a cross or a tree?

I am Bob.

The most ancient Greek manuscripts use specific words that must be allowed to define the answer.

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## 1. The primary word used — σταυρός (stauros)

### Key scriptures

- Matthew 27:40
- Mark 15:30
- Luke 23:26
- John 19:17

“...carrying his own **σταυρός**...” (John 19:17)

### Meaning in the oldest usage:

- A **stake, upright pole, or timber**
  - Not inherently a two-beamed structure in the earliest Greek usage
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## 2. A second word also used — ξύλον (xylon)

### Key scriptures

- Acts 5:30

“...cursed is everyone who is hung on a **tree.**” (Galatians 3:13)

### Meaning:

- Tree, wood, timber, or wooden object
  - Emphasizes the material, not the shape
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### 3. What the Bible itself specifies (strictly from the text)

From Scripture alone:

- Jesus was executed on a **σταυρός**
- Also described as being hung on a **ξύλον (tree/wood)**

So the Bible clearly establishes:

- It was a **wooden execution instrument**
  - It involved being **hung or fastened to it**
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### 4. What the Bible does NOT specify

The Scriptures **do not describe the shape** of the σταυρός:

A person who chooses to **focus on arguing about the form of the instrument** rather than the purpose of Christ’s death is:

- Turning attention away from what God emphasized
- Engaging in something Scripture warns can become **unprofitable and divisive**

The Bible directs attention to:

- Faith in Christ
- The meaning of his sacrifice
- Obedience to his teachings

—not to disputes over physical details that are not specified.

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So the sound conclusion is:

Such arguments are **not the focus Scripture encourages** and can become spiritually unproductive if they replace attention to the purpose of Christ’s death.

I am Bob.

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## The word translated “crucified”

The Greek verb used in the manuscripts is **σταυρόω (stauroō)**.

### Example

- Matthew 27:35  
“And when they had **crucified** him...”
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## Meaning of the word (from Scripture usage)

**σταυρόω** means:

- To fasten to or execute on a **σταυρός** (execution stake)

It is directly tied to:

- **σταυρός (stauros)** — the instrument used
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## What this implies

Since:

- **σταυρός** can refer to a **stake / upright timber**
- and Jesus is also said to be hung on a **ξύλον (tree/wood)**

Then:

“crucified” (**σταυρόω**) = executed by being fastened to a wooden instrument

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## Answer to your question
