### **Overview / Theme of the Bible (Scripture-centered):**

- John 3:16 — Faith in the Son brings life.
- Matthew 4:17 — Jesus preached “the Kingdom of heaven.”

**Theme point:** Jesus is the promised “seed,” the King of God’s Kingdom, and the one through whom salvation comes.

## 6) The Issue of Judgment (Basis Clearly Stated)

- John 3:18 —  
“Whoever believes in him is not judged, but whoever does not believe is judged already...”

**Theme point:** The dividing line is faith in the Son.

---

## 7) Restoration of All Things

- Revelation 21:3–4 — Death, pain, and suffering are removed.
- Psalm 37:29 — “The righteous will possess the earth.”

**Theme point:** God’s original purpose is fully restored—righteous humans living forever on earth.
